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A Christmas Message of Hope

As we draw to the close of another year what can be said about 2020 which hasn't already been said or reported? 2020 has seen a new virus spreading rapidly throughout the whole world causing pain, death and upheaval, resulting in fear, anger, confusion and rebellion. We are living in unprecedented times.

Looking back to spring and early summer when the national lockdown was in full force, it gave plenty of time for reflection except, perhaps, to those key workers who worked long and hard hours in trying to keep the nation fit and healthy or in ensuring that there were food supplies available to all. Many caring for others paid with their lives, especially within the NHS. Into autumn, Government restrictions continued to affect our lives: changes occurred almost daily causing further isolation and uncertainty. Now, with winter and its long, dark nights upon us, we are once more into a second form of lockdown. Announcing the lockdown, the Prime Minister told us that we must prepare for a very different Christmas this year, however, "by taking tough action now" he hoped to save Christmas for families.

As Christians, what are we to make of all this? The one thing that we cannot ignore is the fact that, for the first time in history, our churches were shut down and we were driven out of our comfort zones into an arid, desert place. Even now, at the time of writing, many churches remain closed and those which are open may only do so, once more, for private prayer. We cannot celebrate Christmas in the usual way: we cannot hold joint Emergency Services' Carol Services and even if we enter our own particular church, all is surreal. Many church leaders have tried to carry on as best they could, putting their energies into finding new and creative ways of continuing rituals and practices performed in the past. Getting through this pandemic is seen as the priority until things can get back to normal. But is this really what God is asking for? Are we truly reflecting on the situation in which we find ourselves? Are we really listening to our Lord God? Using the words of Zedekiah, who was under threat from the Babylonians, to the prophet Jeremiah "Is there any word from the Lord?" (Jer 37:17).

We can learn much from the prophets who, from Moses to John the Baptist and of course, Jesus, himself, were desert people. They, too, lived in ungodly times very similar to our own. All prophets lived amongst and dealt with rebellious peoples: they were lone voices crying out in the wilderness. They spoke out against wrong values and practices, calling the people back into their covenant relationship with the Lord. The people, invariably, refused to listen. During the exile of the Jews in Babylon, the people rejected their God who had brought them out of slavery in Egypt: they no longer followed in His ways rather they absorbed the ways and beliefs of the Babylonians. Post Exile, Haggai's intention was to rebuild the Temple in Jerusalem in order to restore the religious life and faith of the nation.

(Haggai 2:6) Haggai wasn't the only prophet to foresee a great shaking of the nations. Some 600 years later, the writer of Hebrews also foresaw the time of a great shaking when "Once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heavens. The words once more indicate the removing of what can be shaken – that is, created things - so that what cannot be shaken may remain." (Hebrews 12: 27).

I firmly believe that those days are now upon us and that God is using the pandemic to bring about His purposes. God is shaking the nations, calling us individually and corporately back to Himself. Like the ancient Israelites, we are in the desert and are being called to learn the lessons of the desert. Whilst, the world over, we are covering our faces trying to protect ourselves and others against a killer disease, the Lord is allowing the masks, which hide our real fears and natures, to slip. All manner of things and evils are being exposed including, or perhaps especially, the wrong doings of His Church. In the desert we are stripped of our self-importance, self-righteousness, self-seeking and personal authority. The Lord knows and sees all: there is no hiding place in busy-ness or good works. He lays everything bare and asks "Who do you say I am?' (Matthew 16"15) He seeks our commitment to serve Him alone. It is not a case of God being on our side, rather it is the Lord's challenge to each of us as to whose side we are on. He waits to hear the words "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord.' (Joshua 24:15). We need to welcome and willingly enter this desert experience - by being still, repenting and humbly asking for forgiveness. Then we wait on the Lord - we watch, pray, read our bibles and listen to what He is saying to us and how we individually and corporately may change and be changed. We stand at the crossroads. If we refuse to heed this call, then we will continue on old paths, instead of looking for the ancient paths as described by Jeremiah (Jer. 6:16): we will do so at our own peril.

Whatever situation we find ourselves in this Christmas, whether crewing an ambulance, working from home or on planned leave, we must recognize the falsehood of the Prime Minister's statement about saving Christmas for families. The truth is that the events and joyous message of Christmas remain the same now as they were 2000 years ago and will be forever. Christ came to save us, not the other way around. Our hope lies, not in the commercial and man-made trappings of a specific time related festival season or even in our family gatherings, but in God' precious gift of himself in the form of Jesus Christ, who is our Lord, Saviour and Redeemer. Let us look beyond the baby in the manger to the man, Jesus Christ, whose mission was to call us back to himself, promising eternal life to all who believe in Him.

This Christmas, may the Light of the World lighten our darkness so that our relationship with Him may be deepened, our faith renewed and that we may be true beacons of light during these dark and challenging times.

Obituary

Revd. Simon Woodmore 04/01/1969 – 19/09/2020

It is with immense sadness that I share with you the recent death of our friend, colleague and fellow CAA member - Reverend Simon Woodmore. After suffering a stroke a few days beforehand, Simon passed away on Saturday 19th September 2020. He was 51 years old. He and I first met in the latter part of 2016. Simon had just completed his Curacy training in the Anglican Church, and was featured later that same year in the LAS staff magazine, occupying a double-page glossy article on his new 'dual role'! Dressed in his vestments and dog collar, Simon



was beaming from ear to ear, and really looked the part! A few months prior to spotting this article, I'd been praying into something God had placed on my own heart – creating a workplace Christian Fellowship group, to share faith and build community within the LAS, pan-London.

Simon was very keen to get involved, and with several other friends from across the Service, we met together for discussion & prayer over pancakes!.. And so, by God's grace, the LAS Christian Fellowship was born in January 2017 – "CONNECT", as it affectionately became known.

Over the past 4 years, Simon has served faithfully to help support colleagues in their time of need, as well as making a tremendous effort to help raise the profile of the group amongst senior management, and becoming a friend to many. Simon loyally stood by my side as Vice Chair of the group, offering his unwavering support through some pretty challenging times for London. In 2018, CONNECT merged with the CAA, of which Simon was a keen supporter behind the scenes, and he gave his blessing to rename the group "CAA-London" later this year.

Simon was a well-known figure within the LAS, long before I knew of him. Having joined the London Ambulance Service in 1991 – serving for more than 29 years - he had grown to become a greatly-respected colleague by many who knew him. He started working in PTS, qualifying as an Ambulance Person in 1992, and then later qualified as a Paramedic. After taking on several local management roles, Simon joined the CBRN Team as an Operations Officer in 2004. Two years later, he joined the newly formed HART Team as a Team Leader, before eventually moving to his final role as Operations Officer for HART, where he built the newly formed HART (West London) team in 2011.

'Man of Action, Man of Faith, Man of Family'

Christian Ambulance Association Simon later qualified as a National Inter Agency Liaison Officer (NILO), working on many national groups for HART & CBRN response. He played an instrumental role establishing HART in London, and across the country; his involvement is considered fundamental to getting HART to where it is today. He stood beside his colleagues in the midst of many of London's disasters, including the Wraysbury Flooding in 2014, the Westminster Bridge & London Bridge Attacks in 2017, and he also supported colleagues during the extended response of the Grenfell Tower Fire that same year.

Within the LAS, as well as being instrumental in founding the LAS Christian Fellowship, Simon also became an informal chaplain to friends and colleagues – of all faiths and none – conducting Christenings, Weddings and Funerals upon request.

Outside of work, Simon went on to serve as a Priest to St Lawrence's Church parish in Bovingdon, Hertfordshire. He was devoted to caring for the needs of his congregation, always having the welfare and comfort of everyone around him at heart. On top of all that, Simon also loved his time working with humanitarian relief charities – such as Hands International in the Calais Refugee Camp – and SARAID Search and Rescue in Sierra Leone. Before he died, Simon had recently served as a Volunteer Chaplain in the Mount Prison, Bovingdon; he spoke excitedly of his plans to retire from Ambulance life next year, and devote the rest of his time to serving those behind bars. Simon demonstrated compassion and Christ-centred love in a way that I will always remember.

Simon's funeral was streamed live on YouTube, which has received some 1,300 viewings. In a tribute by his mentor, colleague and friend – Rev Charles Burch – Simon was aptly described as a '*Man of Action, Man of Faith, Man of Family*'. This beautiful testament to Simon's life sums up so much of the heart that he shared. His family meant the absolute world to him, and he spoke fondly of their adventures together.

I will always remember Simon as dear friend, and he will be deeply missed. He had a great sense of humour, and his convictions of God's love for all people resonated in the way he lived his life. We will treasure the wonderful memories we have of him, and rejoice that he is now standing face-to-face before His Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, worshipping with all of Heaven. May he rest in peace and rise in glory, and may the God of all hope comfort those he leaves behind.


